## Reflection - Class Session 11.5.12

I really like the activity we did talking about the definition of learning. I was supposed to be a behaviorist, but I clearly don't agree with that point of view completely, so it was hard to stick with it. In my small group before we split up we were sure to include something with observable behavior in our definition. That is the key difference in that behaviorism is known for.
